The world famous potters in Longton, Staffordshire.

It all started in Lanes End Longton, Staffordshire.

"Lane End" was the historical name for the area that is now known as **Longton**, one of the six towns that federated to form the city of Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire. The name change from Lane End to Longton occurred in the mid-19th century, with the area officially incorporated as the Borough of Longton in 1865.



"Lanes End" refers to the original location in Staffordshire where John Aynsley founded his pottery business in 1775, not a specific china pattern. The company is known for its fine bone china and intricate patterns like Cottage Garden, Pembroke, and Wild Tudor.
